This reading list is not comprehensive—it is a list of recommended readings. As a general rule, you should be familiar with classic and recent literature in six domains: (1) General Introduction (20 Items), (2) Demographic Theory (23 Items), (3) Data and Methods (48 Items), (4) Fertility and Family Demography (71 items), (5) Migration and Population Distribution (43 items), and (6) Mortality and Morbidity (58 items). To be broadly familiar, you should read the top sociology and demography journals (all of which are cited heavily in this list). Preliminary examination questions are typically broad and ask you to think across literatures to synthesize, using the literature to construct your own argument in response to questions.
